### Asian Aquarium Trade Impacts California Marine Life


The booming marine aquarium market in the States has had tragic consequences for Western Pacific coral reefs. The indiscriminate use of trawlers to collect tropical fish has decimated coral reefs in the Philippines and other areas. Fuelled by the insatiable demand of Western aquarium owners,

Nova Edmontagroup, Santa Barbara, claims that the problem has spread in the opposite direction. The brilliant orange Garibaldi, a member of the same Damselfish family which includes species found throughout the Pacific, is a popular aquarium fish, displaying blue spots on a golden-orange background. These colours are highly prized by Asian collectors as implying long life and success.

are declining. However, commercial collection of the beautiful fish is not legally prohibited, and continues at other locations on California's shores. It is estimated that 85% of the Garibaldi collected are exported to Japan, Taiwan and Hong Kong.

Even worse, the juvenile Garibaldi are doomed to die in the warm Asian tropical tanks they are placed in, as they thrive only in cooler California waters. As the environmental arm of DEMA, Ocean Futures is working to have laws passed so that the Garibaldi will be officially protected from collecting until scientific studies can evaluate how commercial operations impact their population. We can only hope that Asian aquarium owners will ultimately understand
